DJ Premier is ready to battle

He can produce. He can make a crowd move. He can collaborate. What can't DJ Premier, one of the world's greatest beat makers, do?

How about battle? Tonight, he'll go one-on-one in a friendly DJ battle with DJ Scratch as a part of the City Parks Foundation's free summer concert festival. But while DJ Premier has been a legendary hip-hop figure and respected producer, he admits that turntable wizardry is not his strength.

"He's got a battle style, and I'm

not a battle DJ," he said. "Even though I'm not nice with the tricks, I'm just going to have fun."

Premier has been having fun in hip-hop since the late 1980s. He provided the beats for Gang Starr, one of hip-hop's most influential groups; produced tracks for Nas, Rakim and KRS-One; and runs his own label, Year Round Records. While many artists who started in the late '80s have hung up their microphones and put away their records, Premier has remained relevant.

"We have more experience and we value the culture in a dif-

ferent way than the newer generation," he said of himself and his contemporaries. "The majority of [newer rappers] could care less about the '80s and '90s. They give the same excuse: 'I wasn't born then.' Well, I wasn't born when Elvis Presley or Billie Holiday was around either, but I like their records. Care about music. You

should know your history."

That care for music comes through in his current-day productions, including most recently the debut album of Blaq Poet. Premier has but one rule for his work.

"It has to be something I can stand by," he said. "I make stuff that I would buy myself."

Originally self-released in March of this year and now receiving a much buzzed-about second wind, "Hospice" successfully retains its handmade feel and panoramic, gut-shuddering sound. By seeding
